

Articles of a Treaty

Made and concluded
at Taney Point, near Clatsop Plains this Ninth day of Au-
gust Eighteen hundred and Fifty one, between Susan Dart
Superintendent of Indian Affairs, Henry A. Spalding Indian
Agent and Soniah L. Parnish Sub Indian Agent on the part
of the United States of the one part, and the undersigned
Chiefs and Headmen of the Kathlamet Band of the
Chinook Tribe of Indians, of the other part,

Article 1. The said Kathlamet band of Chinook In-
dians hereby cede to the United States the tract of land
included within the following boundaries viz: Begin-
ning at a point of land on Young's Bay called Ah-piu-
piu running thence Northerly and Easterly following the
Southern shore of the Columbia River up to Hunts Mill,
thence South on the west line of lands of the Konnaach
band of Chinooks to the Northern boundaries of lands
of the Klatskania band of Chinooks, thence westerly fol-
lowing said northern boundary and the northern boundary
of lands formerly claimed by the Nuc-que-clah-we-nuck band
of Indians. Also all the Islands in the Columbia River
opposite the above described land. The above description
is intended to include all the land owned or claimed
by said Kathlamet band of Indians.

Article 2. The said Kathlamet band reserve from the cession
+ aforesaid, two of the Islands in the Columbia River to wit:
One called Woody Island, and one called by the Indians Shy-
lic-la. The said band also reserve the privilege of residing
at what is called the old Kathlamet town, and of cutting tim-
ber on the land above described, for their own fuel and building
purposes.

Article 3. In consideration of the cession in the first article of this Treaty the United States agree to pay to the aforesaid Kathlamet band of Indians an annuity of seven hundred Dollars for the term of ten years, as follows to wit: One hundred Dollars in money, Twenty Blankets, Ten Wooden boats, Ten pairs Pants, Ten Vests, Twenty Shirts, Twenty pairs Shoes, Fifty yards Linsey Plaid, One hundred yards calico, One hundred yards Shirting, Eight Blanket Shawls, One hundred pounds Soap, One barrel Salt, Fifteen bags Flour, One hundred pounds Tobacco, Ten Axes, Fifteen Knives, Twenty five bottom Handkerchiefs, One barrel Molasses, One hundred pounds Sugar, Ten pounds Tea, Three eight-quart Brass Kettles, Ten ten-quart Tin Pails, Twelve Pint cups, Ten Six-quart Pans, Ten Caps, One Hog Parden. All of the above articles to be of good quality, and delivered at Burnies landing on the Columbia River.

Article 4 There shall be perpetual peace and friendship between all the Citizens of the United States of America and all the individuals composing the said Kathlamet band of Chinook Indians.

Article 5. This agreement shall be binding and obligatory upon the contracting parties, as soon as the same shall be ratified and confirmed by the President and Senate of the United States.

have hereunto set their hands and seals at the
time and place first herein above written.
