
## Treaty Made and Concluded at Tansey Point near Clatstop Plains, 9 August 1851 between Anson Dart, Sup.Ind. Affairs & Others, on the part of the U.S. and the Wheelappa Band of the Chinook Tribe of Indians

This treaty with the Wheelappa Band of the Chinook Tribe of Indians was one of 13 agreements made with tribes of western Oregon Country in August 1851. The treaty ceded land bounded on the north by the Chehalis, on the east by the Cowlitz, on the south by the Wahkiakum and Lower Chinook, and on the west by the ocean and Shoalwater (Willapa) Bay. Article 2 identified the "express understanding that the land shall be reserved for the exclusive use of the Chinook tribes or bands and the Cheehales tribe of Indians," if only they gave up their rights and moved to the lands identified in the treaty. In return, the United States agreed to provide an Indian agency, a manual labor school, blacksmith shop, farming establishment and other services at "some point on the lands ceded above, provided the abovementioned Indians consent to congregate upon said lands and 'give up their reserved rights,' as named in article two of this treaty" within a year of ratification by the U.S. President and Senate. Based on this agreement, many Chinook and Chehalis people moved to Bay Center, Washington and awaited treaty ratification, while expecting a reservation, payment, and the services promised by the government. No payment or services arrived until 1912, when the Indian Claims Commission authorized \$5,000 for the Willapa as part of an 1899 legal suit. Meanwhile, many of the Willapa's descendants remain in the Bay Center and South Bend area of Washington State. The Willapa were politically connected and intermarried long before they joined together under a constitution with four other Chinook tribes in 1951 – to seek recognition and treaty reserved tribal rights as part of the Chinook Indian Nation. at Tausey Point, wear blatsop Plains this North day of August Eightun hundred and Fifty One between An-Don Dart Superintendent of Indian Affairs, Hung OH, Spal dieg Indian Agent and Social & Parish Sub-Indian Agent on the part of the United States of the one part and the undersigned Chiefs or Headmen of the Wheelappa band of the Chinok Indians of the other part.

Article 1. The said Wheelappa band of Indians hereby cede to the United States all the land owned or claimed by the said band. The land intended to be hereby ceded is bounded on the North by fands owned by the Chechales Tribe of Indians, on the East by the Cowlitz band of Indians, on the East by the Cowlitz band of Indians, on the East by the Decan and Lower bands of Chimoks and on the West by the Ocean and Shoal water Bay.

Anticle 2. The above cession is made with the express under that the shall be reserved for the exclusive use of the Chinook Tribes or bands, and the Chuhales Tribe of Indians, provided the majority of them shall consent to give up their reserved rights to the lands they now occutry and remove to the lands ceded in Article first of this Treaty.

Article 3. It is hurby a greed on the part of the United States that they shall establish an agency, a manual labor school, blacksmith shop, farming establishment ve. at some frint on the lands above ceded; Provided, the above mentioned Indians consent to congregate upon said lands and "give up their reserved right," as named in Article 2. of this Greaty, within one year after the rat = ification of this treaty by the President and senate of the

friet Article of this Treaty the United States agent to pay to the said Wheelappa Ordians an annuity of Lin hundred Dollars in the following manner on; Our hundred and Fifty Dollars in money, I wenty fine Blankets, Four wolen locats, Four pairs pants, Four beets, Four pairs members & Ten pairs nonew's Shores, In Shores, Surfay pards Linsey Plaids, Our hundred yards bat-ico, Our hundred yards Brown muslin, Eight-Blanket Shawls, Fifty founds Joap, Justiff promots Jea, Our hundred periods Jugar, Eight-Bucks Flow, Fire Braf Stettles (eight-quant) Fire two-quant Jin Pails, Fire sir-quant Jin Pails, The above articles are to be of good quality, and delived at Juny Pairt, aforeraid, Our hundred Dollars of the money to be used for Educational purposes, provided the conditions of Articles second and third of this treaty are complied with.

Article 5. There shall be perpetual peace and friend= Ship between all the citizens of the Muiled States and all the individuals Comparing said Wheelappa band of Indians.

Article 6. The cession made in Article first is intended to Embrace the land formerly owned by the Quillequerqua band of Indians of whom only one man remains, Moaest, who is a signer of this treaty.

Article of This agreement shall be briding and oblig atomy upon the contracting parties as soon as the same shall be ratified and confirmed by the Pundut and Senate of the miled States.

In testimoney whereof the said Ausen Dart Super = intendent, Cherry A. Spalding Agent and Soriah L. Parrish sub Agent and the said Chiefs ordead men of the Wheelappa and Quillequeoqua Indians have shereunto set their hands and reals, the time and place first herein above written,
